Jack Rabbitt will present his program on "The Civil War: Why Did So Many Die?" Topics to be discussed include:

- New weapons with old tactics
- Medical knowledge and practices
- Elements of camp life that contributed to the germination and spread of disease
- And recent research that indicated the death toll of the war at 750.000 which is more that the long-standing figure of 620,000.

He has been fascinated with the Civil War since the age of 10 and has visited many battlefields. He is a published author.

October 27, 2021 Meeting

Carolyn Coppola Reconstruction, Bluffton & Campbell AME Church

Carolyn has been active in historic preservation since 2007. She nominates buildings to the National Register of Historic Places and defines plans for rehabilitating historic residential, commercial and industrial properties.

She will be talking about the Campbell Chapel AME Church to our group on October 27. The Campbell Chapel AME Church was formerly listed on the National Register of Historic Places, one of only two buildings in Bluffton that are individually listed. Her research led to a rich and compelling story about freedom in Bluffton and the low country during the post-Civil War period. She will talk about the social, religious, political, and economic changes after the Civil Ear which enabled the church to symbolize a new life for its congregation.

December 2, 2021

C. Russell Horres Morris Island and the Civil War

Due to Thanksgiving, our November meeting will be held in early December. Russel Horres is a native of Charleston and currently resides in Mount Pleasant. He has been a volunteer research and interpretative guide for the National Park Service since 2001. His work with the National Park Service has led to the discovery of long-lost records of the construction of Fort Sumter. He is the author of *Morris Island and the Civil War Strategy and Influence*.

Morris Island held a critical position in the Civil War. It was first used by the Confederates in the bombardment of Ft. Sumter and Charleston. Then the roles were reversed and the Union forces used the site to also bombard Ft. Sumter and Charleston. Both sides expended a vast amount of money for what appeared to be of little value.

Beaufort History Museum Living History Encampment

The Beaufort History Museum will present a Civil War Era Living History Encampment on Saturday, December 4 in the Arsenal courtyard, Re-enactors from the New York 79th Highlanders and New York 48th Infantry Regiment will portray Union troops from the Department of the South who were garrisoned in the Lowcountry and occupied the Beaufort Arsenal during the Civil War. The re-enactors will set up camp in the walled Arsenal courtyard and provide a unique educational opportunity for visitors of all ages, who will be able to interact with the soldiers to learn firsthand and how life was lived in Beaufort during the Civil War years.

Beaufort History Museum is a nonprofit corporation and is devoted to facilitating, displaying and managing the collection of art and artifacts owned by the City of Beaufort.

Friends of Honey Hill

The Friends of Honey Hill are excited to report that we are beginning the process of clearing trails on the battlefield, in our ongoing mission to preserve this very special and hallowed ground. As we near the 157th anniversary of the actions that took place on November 30th 1864, we're continually reminded of the many sacrifices by both sides - and the importance of the stories they left behind. Gallant actions by ordinary soldiers, commanders who led bravely from the front, and a 21-year-old African-American Corporal in the 55th Massachusetts would forever leave their imprint on the slopes of Honey Hill. After watching his color sergeant fall, Andrew Jackson Smith would lift the flag of the 55th and carry on through the hail of bullets and grape shot, taking a wound in the process. Colonel Hartwell (who commanded a brigade that day), would have 3 horses shot from beneath him and take a wound himself, with the heroic Captain Thomas Ellsworth risking his life to carry Hartwell from the battlefield - earning a Medal of Honor for his actions. Corporal Smith's own Medal of Honor took generations to award, but his bravery at such a young age exemplified the passion and determination of African-American soldiers. As you weave through the battlefield, these and other stories will shed a light on what happened in late fall of 1864.

Well-marked trails will provide visitors a pathway to history as they stop at key points to view the battlefield from the same angles as troops on either side. The battle featured a large variety of units, and resulted in nearly 1000 combined casualties. While the Confederate troops

temporarily prevented Union soldiers from reaching further inland, these smaller engagements would prove instrumental in hastening a surrender. Sherman's march to the sea would end just 3 weeks after the Battle of Honey Hill, and the Confederacy would fall just a few months later.

Our mission is to protect and preserve the battlefield in Ridgeland for all future generations to visit and learn of the men who fought here, and the reasons for their actions that day. It's rare that such a ground exists - one that was not developed and lies in much the same state as it did over a hundred and fifty years ago. That's not to say the path ahead is easy - there is much work that needs doing, from clearing the trails and creating paths, to eventually paving a parking lot and beyond. We are dedicated to the project, and have secured grants and funding to work towards these goals. And we'd love to have anyone with a passion for history and a love of stories to join us. Juneteenth Celebration

Juneteenth is the oldest nationally celebrated commemoration of the ending of slavery in the United States. Dating back to 1865, it was on June 19th that the Union soldiers, led by Major General Gordon Granger, landed at Galveston, Texas, with news that the war had ended and that the slaves were now free.

Juneteenth is celebrated every year in Historic Mitchellville Freedom Park. From the Praise House to the Bateau, the park features historical exhibits that will take you back in time. The park is open daily from 6 AM to 9 PM. There are self-guided tours, events, and you can bring a picnic lunch or dinner to enjoy the beautiful coastline views.

Civil War Round Table Congress News and Events

The American Battlefield Trust wrapped up a large chapter of preservation efforts at the Harpers Ferry Battlefield by donating the last of four tracts totaling approximating 17 areas to the National Park Service. This parcel will now be part of the Harpers Ferry National Historical Park. Over the past 29 years the trust has successes in saving 542 areas of hallowed ground at the West Virginia battlefield.
