

## **BATTLE OF SHILOH: BLOODY SUNDAY** PRESENTED BY WILEY SWORD

he Battle of Shiloh, or Pittsburg Landing, April 6-7, 1862, was one of the bloodiest of the Civil War. Of the 65,085 troops of the Army of Tennessee and the Army of the Ohio 23,746 commanded by Maj. Gen. Ulysses S. Grant Grant and Maj. Gen. Don Carlos Buell (US) and



the 44,968 troops commanded by Gen. Albert Sidney Johnston and Gen. P.E. T. Beauregard (CS), 13,047 men of the Union and 10,699 men of the Confederacy were counted as casualties.

As a result of the fall of Forts Henry and Donelson, Confederate Gen. Albert Sidney






Johnston, was forced to fall back, giving up Kentucky and much of West and Middle Tennessee. He

Buell chose Corinth, Mississippi, a ma-

jor transportation center, as the staging are for an offensive against Grant before Buell

could join in. William Tecupseh Sherman, division commander, was quoted saying to reporters, "Take your regiment to Ohio. No enemy is nearer than



Corinth." Little did he know that the night of April 5, the huge and powerful Army of the Mississippi was poised to strike just out of sight of the Union camp.

The Confederate retrenchment was a surprise to Grant, but gave him an opportunity to move his army to confront Johns-



ton along the Tennessee River. Grant did not choose to fortify his position; rather

he set about drilling his men many of which were raw recruits. Attacking the Union troops on the morning of the 6<sup>th</sup>, the Confederates surprised them, routing many.

uring the battle Johnston had been mortally wounded and his second in command, Gen. P. (Continued on page 4 Sword)

E.T. Beauregard, took over. Beauregard chose not to press his advantage until the next morning. By that time Buell had joined Grant with a combined force of 40,000 against Beauregard's 30,000. Beauregard was unaware of the arrival of Buell's army and launched a counterattack which stopped the Union advance, but did not break its battle line.

t this point, Beauregard realized that he could not win and, having suffered too many casualties, he retired from the field and headed back to Corinth. Grant's mastery of the Confederate forces continued; he had beaten them once again. The Confederates continued to fall back until launching their mid-August offensive.

Beaufort's Gen. Richard H. Anderson Chapter of the Sons of Confederate Veterans will be hosting their 5<sup>th</sup> annual Military Ball Saturday, November 1<sup>st</sup>, 2003 in Beaufort at the Historic Arsenal. Members of the 11<sup>th</sup> South Carolina Volunteer Infantry and the Gen. Stephen Elliott Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy will also be assisting in the preparation and participating in this year's festivities. The period band Un Reconstructed will provide lively musical entertainment at this years gala event including calling such popular dances as the Virginia Reel and Broom Dance. An open bar and heavy hors d'oeuvres will be included in this year's price.

The cost of the event will be \$25 for currently "Active" members of the local SCV and UDC Chapters and 11<sup>th</sup> South Carolina Volunteer Infantry. The resounding applause given to him demonstrated our appreciation of his talk. He had two of his books available for sale and most were gone at the end of the evening.


Duke's catering was off to a good start. We look forward to our many other speakers and we will only hope that Brian Wills will accept another invitation for a future talk.

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
