


#### MAC WYKOFF

r Wykoff graduated from Linfield College in McMInnville, Oregon with a degree in history. He was employed as a historian for the National Park Service for 25 years which included work at Fort Sumter National Monument (where he was the first civilian to live at the fort), Shiloh, Chickamauga and Chattanooga and for the last 18 years at the four battlefields around Fredericksburg,

He has published books on the 2<sup>nd</sup> South Carolina and the 3<sup>rd</sup> South Carolina of General Kershaw's Brigade as well as several articles on this brigade. He operates a website called *South Carolina in the Civil War* and co-founded an annual symposium concerning South Carolina in the Civil War.

He has led battlefield tours for many groups including Civil War Round Tables, American and British military units, senior citizens, school children and the FBI Training Academy. He lectured to many Civil War Round Tables throughout the country. Mac is a co-founder of the *Rappahannock Valley Civil War Round Table* and the current newsletter editor of this group.

## Season schedule

**NOVEMBER 10 BATTLE OF FREDERICKSBURG\*** On December 13, 1862, Union General Burnside built his bridges, crossed the Rappahannock, and assailed General Lee's army in its prepared position. One will also learn about the Angel of Marye's Heights via **Mac Wyckoff** a long time member and leader of the Rappahannock Valley CW Roundtable and sought after Civil War presenter.

**JANUARY 12 FAITH IN THE FIGHT: CHAPLAINS IN THE CIVIL WAR\*** The chaplains on both sides fought for the spiritual and physical well-being of the combatants. **Dr. Bud Robertson** is one of our most informative speakers and he is the Director of the Virginia Tech Civil War Center.

**FEBRUARY 9 THE JEWISH CONFEDERATES** Learn about Jewish aspects of the Civil War and their contribution to the Southern war effort. Presented by **Robert N. Rosen** a native of Charleston and founder of The Rosen Law Firm.

**MARCH 9 MURFREESBORO-STONE'S RIVER\*** In May and June of 1863, Maj. Gen. Grant's armies converged on Vicksburg, investing the city and entrapping a Confederate army under Lt. Gen. Pemberton. On July 4, Vicksburg surrendered after prolonged siege operations. A study in the failure of the Confederacy's High Command. This is excitingly presented by **Edwin C. Bearss**, a well known military expert and renowned Civil War lecturer.

**APRIL 13 GEORGIA HEROINES\*** The dedication and hardships that women suffered during the "War Between the States" will be highlighted. Our presenter, **Mrs. Tommie Phillips LaCavera**, is a noted author and very knowledgeable about the Daughters of the American Revolution, the United Daughters of the Confederacy, and the U.S. Daughters of 1812.

**MAY 11 THE FIRE-EATERS OF SOUTH CAROLINA** A closer look about those Southerners who were staunch and unyielding advocates of secession. Presented by **Dr. Larry Rowland** of Beaufort, SC. Dr. Rowland, a long time Professor of History at the University of South Carolina - Beaufort.

#### TO BE AUCTIONED AT THIS MEETING



Just after daybreak on the morning of June 11, 1864, Confederate General Wade Hampton and 5,000 Confederate Cavalrymen intercepted Union General Phillip Sheridan's 6,000 Federal Cavalrymen at Trevilian Station in Virginia. A fierce battle erupted in the woods, forcing the cavalrymen to fight on foot. In the heat of the fight, Hampton seized the opportunity to mount a charge against the Federals in a dusty clearing near the railroad. Bolstering Hampton's veterans was a force of newly arrived *South Carolinians* that included the *Cadet Rangers* - Company F of the 6th SC Cavalry - which had been formed at *The Citadel*. 

#### THE HERITAGE LIBRARY
