# Joseph E. Johnston: A Controversial General

## A Look Behind the Scenes and Politics of the Civil War. Presented by Alan Downs



any Civil War historians are quick to point out the military shortcomings of Joe Johnston ultimately relegating him to the second tier of Confederate heroes. They argue Johnston's preference for trading space for time was inappropriate for the Confederacy and merely a reflection of his flaws. It is perhaps worthwhile to examine what was probably his state of mind

as he made those decisions. Joseph Eggelston Johnston was born on February 3, 1807. His father, Peter Johnston, had left college to serve under Light Horse Harry Lee in the closing years of the Revolution, and later became a distinguished jurist. His mother was a niece of Patrick Henry.

He won the first Confederate victory at Bull Run but went on to become at serious odds with the Confederate President Jefferson Davis. He was removed from command only to be restored to duty to lead the fight against General Wm. T. Sherman.

General Johnston, who is rated by many historians as more capable than General Lee, was the highest-ranking regular army officer to resign from the U S Army (West Point 1829) and join the Confederacy. As the Confederacy strove for legitimacy, it made deliberate and tangible reference to the Revolutionary War.

When his former foe, General Sherman, died early in 1891, Johnston served as a pall bearer as he had at the funerals of Grant and Sheridan. He was then 84 and unusually feeble. In the inclement weather, he contracted a cold, his strength gradually failed, and on March 21 he died of a heart attack. He was the last of the great leaders of the Civil War, both Federal and Confederate, with the exception of Beauregard. He was buried in Greenmount Cemetery in Baltimore

### Memo from Jim Hamilton Your Prezident

Greetings and salutations.....it is an honor to be LCWRT's fourth president. In less than ten years we have become the largest active Roundtable in the United States and our eight yearly presentations are considered among the finest in the nation.

An over-simplified review of LCWRT's history indicates during the 1980's and early 90's there were 10 to 20 stalwart individuals in Hilton Head, Bluffton, Beaufort and an occasional Savannahian who came together - now and then, here and there - to discuss various aspects of the Civil War. Some of the names that I can recall include (alpha order) Bruce Claxton, Bob Eberly, Jim Fannon, Jack & Joyce Keller, George Stidworthy.

With the advent of Sun City and its residents from all over the country, "Mac" McCoy, working with the other Civil War buffs in the area, stimulated unprecedented LCWRT growth – overnight we grew to 100 members, to 200, then 400 - all in a matter of five or six years.

In 1999 Bob Eberly (1999-02) was elected our first president and served for two terms. Thanks to Bob, we became an organization with officers, standing committees, by-laws, and chartered by the state of South Carolina as not-for-profit Corporation. Programs were developed and professional speakers came to educate and entertain us at our dinner meetings. We averaged about 100 at dinner with another 20 to 30 in the "bleachers." The "Morning After" meetings began providing

SEPTEMBER 8 TWO FOR ONE Our season kick-off program will have **Music** (5:30 to 6:45) plus a stimulating and articulate Speaker. Your feet will start tapping, your fingers will be snapping as our local troubadour performs many of the Civil War era songs for your enjoyment. OCTOBER 13 THE NAVY BATTLE OF NEW ORLEANS The Union occupation was an event that had major international significance as told by Art Bergeron, who is an author and research historian for the U.S. Military Institute at Carlisle Barracks, PA. He has previously served as the historian for Pamplin Historical Park and the state of Louisiana.

**NOVEMBER 10 BATTLE OF FREDERICKSBURG** On December 13, 1862, Union General Burnside built his bridges, crossed the Rappahannock, and assailed General Lee's army in its prepared position. One will also learn about the Angel of Marye's Heights via Mac Wyckoff a long time member and leader of the Rappahannock Valley CW Roundtable and sought after Civil War presenter.


JANUARY 12 FAITH IN THE FIGHT: CHAPLAINS IN THE CIVIL WAR The chaplains on both sides fought for the spiritual and physical well-being of the combatants. Dr. Robertson is one of our most informative speakers and he is the Director of the Virginia Tech Civil War Center.

FEBRUARY 9 THE JEWISH CONFEDERATES Learn about Jewish aspects of the Civil War and their contribution to the Southern war effort. Presented by Robert N. Rosen a native of Charleston and founder of The Rosen Law Firm.

MARCH 9 THE VICKSBURG CAMPAIGN In May and June of 1863, Maj. Gen. Grant's armies converged on Vicksburg, investing the city and entrapping a Confederate army under Lt. Gen. Pemberton. On July 4, Vicksburg surrendered after prolonged siege operations. This is excitingly presented by Edwin C. Bearss, a well known military expert and renowned Civil War lecturer .

APRIL 13 GEORGIA HEROINES The dedication and hardships that women suffered during the "War Between the States" will be highlighted. Our presenter, Mrs. Tommie Phillips LaCavera, is a noted author and very knowledgeable about the Daughters of the American Revolution, the United Daughters of the Confederacy, and the U.S. Daughters of 1812.

MAY 11 THE FIRE-EATERS OF SOUTH CAROLINA A closer look about those Southerners who were staunch and unyielding advocates of secession. Presented by Dr. Larry Rowland of Beaufort, SC. Dr. Rowland, a long time Professor of History at the University of South Carolina - Beaufort.
