In 1861 the relationship between armies and the outdoors had changed little since antiquity. When the weather was good, the armies moved and fought; when it was not, they stayed put. Billy Yank and Johnny Reb on the march had no protection from the pelting rain or searing heat. The soldiers wrote about it more than any other topic, except maybe their health. Thanks to frigid temperature and snow in winter and rains in the spring, armies could only move and fight from April through early December. In the Deep South, however they campaigned most of the year if the rains did not make the roads impassable and high heat did not so enervate the men that they could not march or fight.

The Greatest Fury. The Battle of New Orleans and the Rebirth of America by Jack Davis

The Battle of Honey Horn was fought in Ridgeland as a diversion to the approach of Sherman to Savannah. It was one of the last 3 significant Confederate victories and marked the first time in the war that black regiments outnumbered white regiments in the Union assault. Cost is \$50.
